Pipe Major Donald MacLeed M.B.E.

Pipe Major Donald MacLeod, born and raised in Stornoway, was Club Piper to the Glasgow Highland Club for twenty great years until his death on 29th June 1982.

His great career as a Competitor was remarkable - eight times winner of the Gold Clasp at the Northern Meeting, three times winner of the Open Piobaireachd at the Argyllshire Gathering, having also won the Highland Society of London's Gold medal at each of these meetings and countless light music events.

This record is well known to pipers the world over as is his distinguished service in the Seaforths.

His special gifts as a composer and teacher will not be forgotten at home or overseas and tonights Competition uses tunes from Donald MacLeod's Collection of Piobaireachd Book 1 - twenty original tunes composed by him.

Donald has left a wealth of great music and his tunes will long continue to be played and acknowledged as the work of a Master Composer. His influence on pipe music and his apparently/

limitless ability to impart the skills of interpretation and execution to those who sought his advice has benefitted immeasurably our ancient art of piping and any memorial which we might make for him is overshadowed by the great legacy he himself left for us.

We in the Glasgow Highland Club were priveleged to know Donald as a great piper, an understanding tutor and an inventive and original Composer, but above all we knew him as a wise and kindly friend, a fine Highland Gentleman for whom we had great respect and admiration.

Tonight's Competition - the first annual

Competition is our tribute to him and a tangible
sign of our sense of gratitude at having known him.

Competitors will be allowed one minute tuning up time and then will play any 6/8 March composed by Pipe Major Donald MacLeod after which one further minutes re-tuning time will be allowed before starting the Competition Piobaireachd.

The Club is fortunate indeed to have two distinguished pipers present tonight to judge the Competition.

Captain John A. MacLellan M.B.E., F.S.A., Scot., is well known to all pipers having been Director of Army Bagpipe Music at Edinburgh Castle for many years with a fine reputation as a player and competitor and now as an administrator through his service in the Piobaireachd Society and its music committee.

Andrew Wright is a gifted player whose long career as a competing piper has been most successful. He studied under Pipe Major Donald MacLeod from the time when Donald came to Glasgow in the mid sixties and won all the major Piobaireachd awards under Donalds tutelage.

We extend a warm welcome to both gentlemen and hope that they enjoy this evening in our Company.

The Prize
